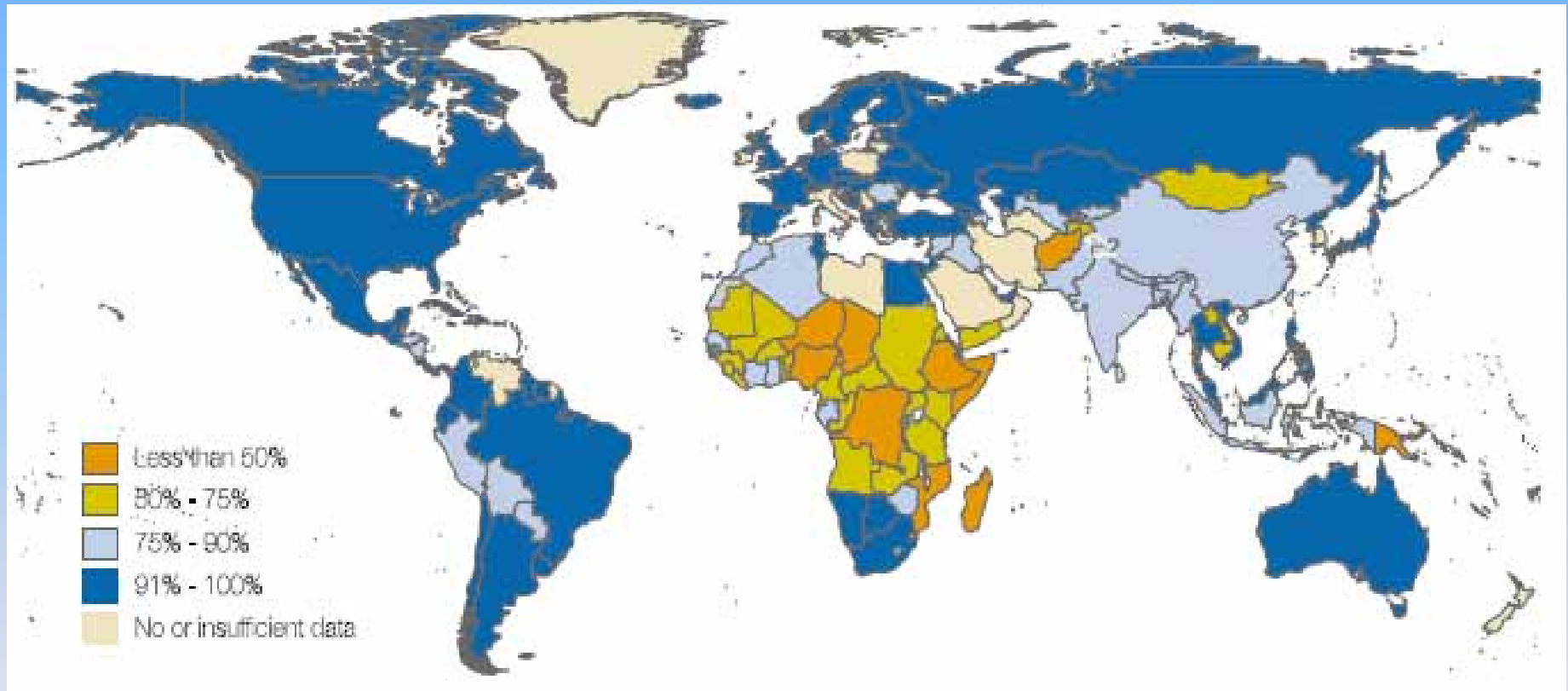

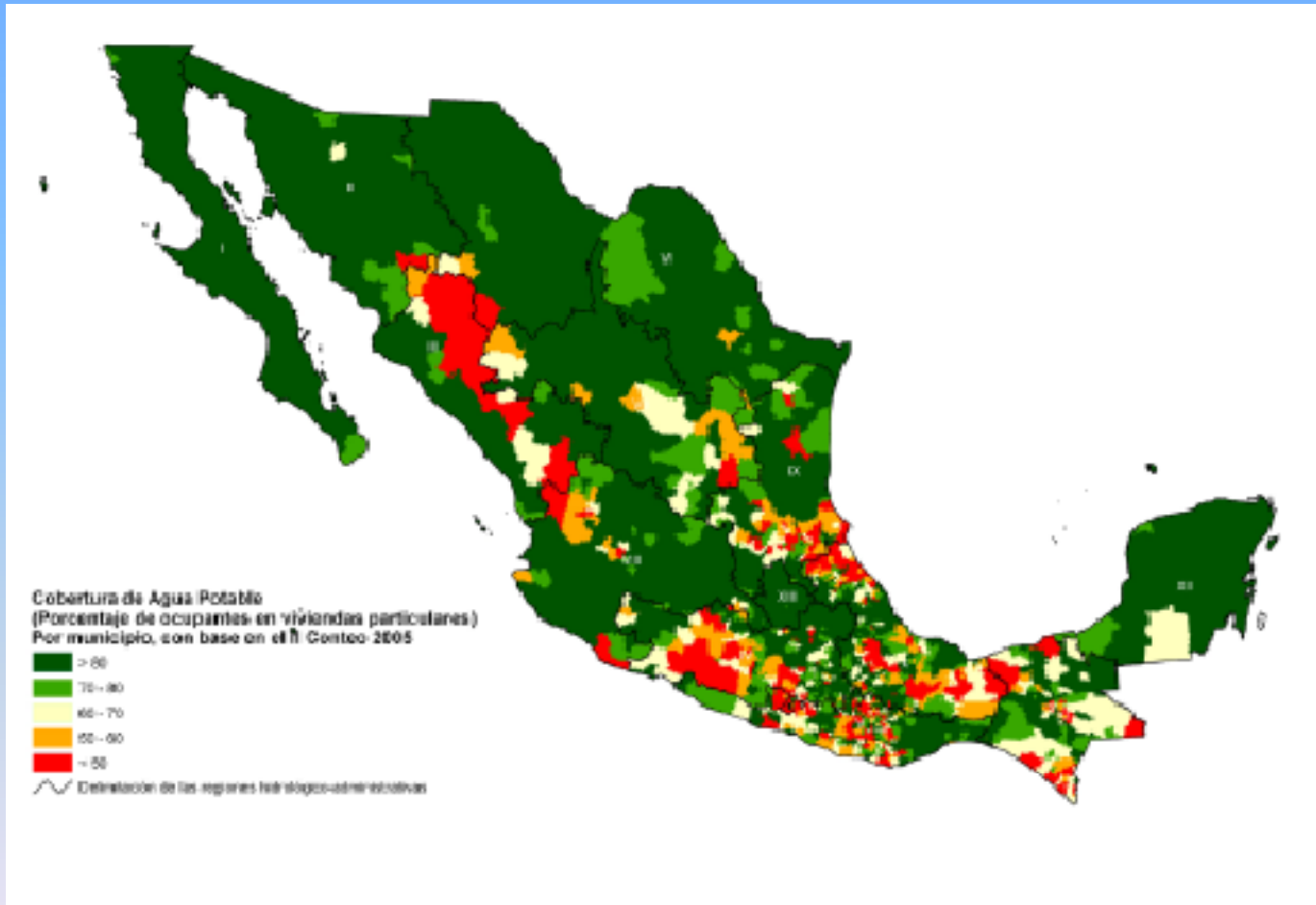

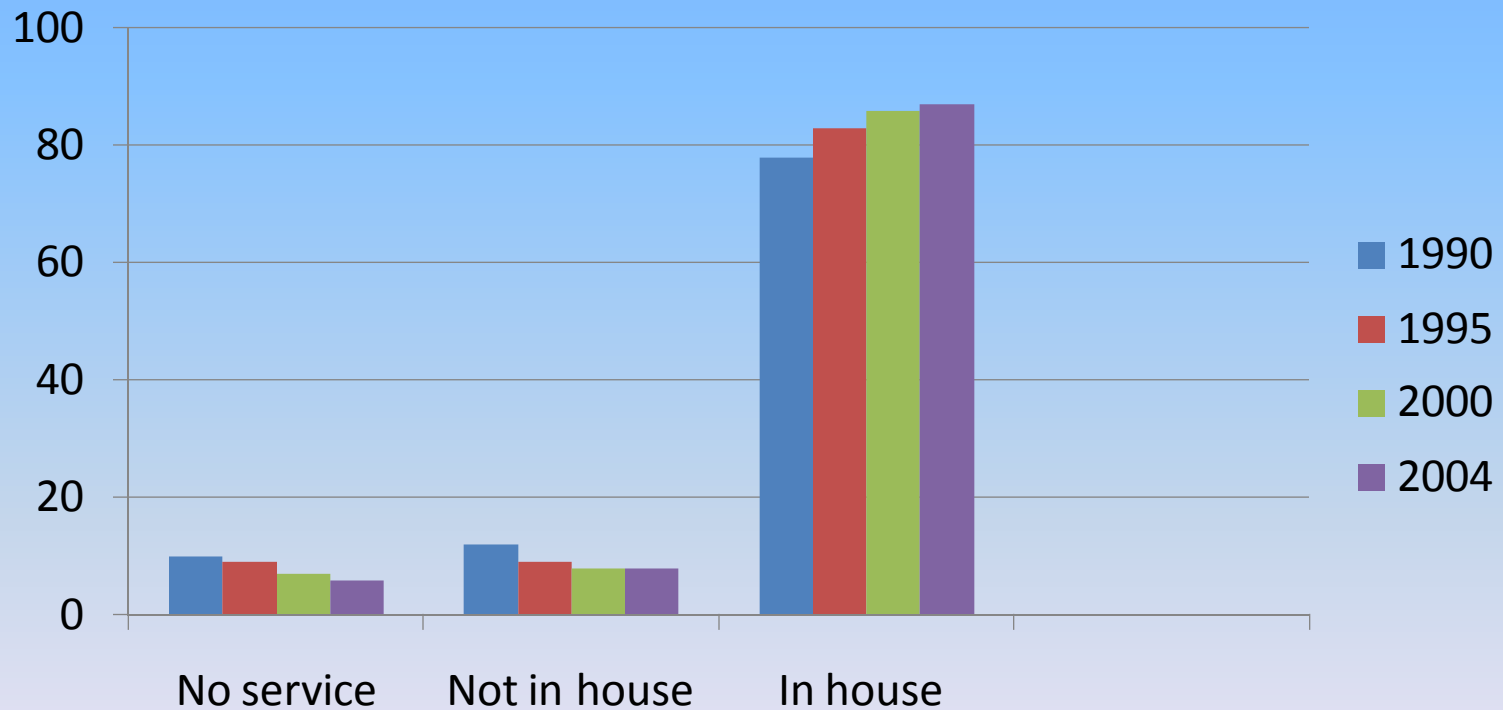


By municipalities



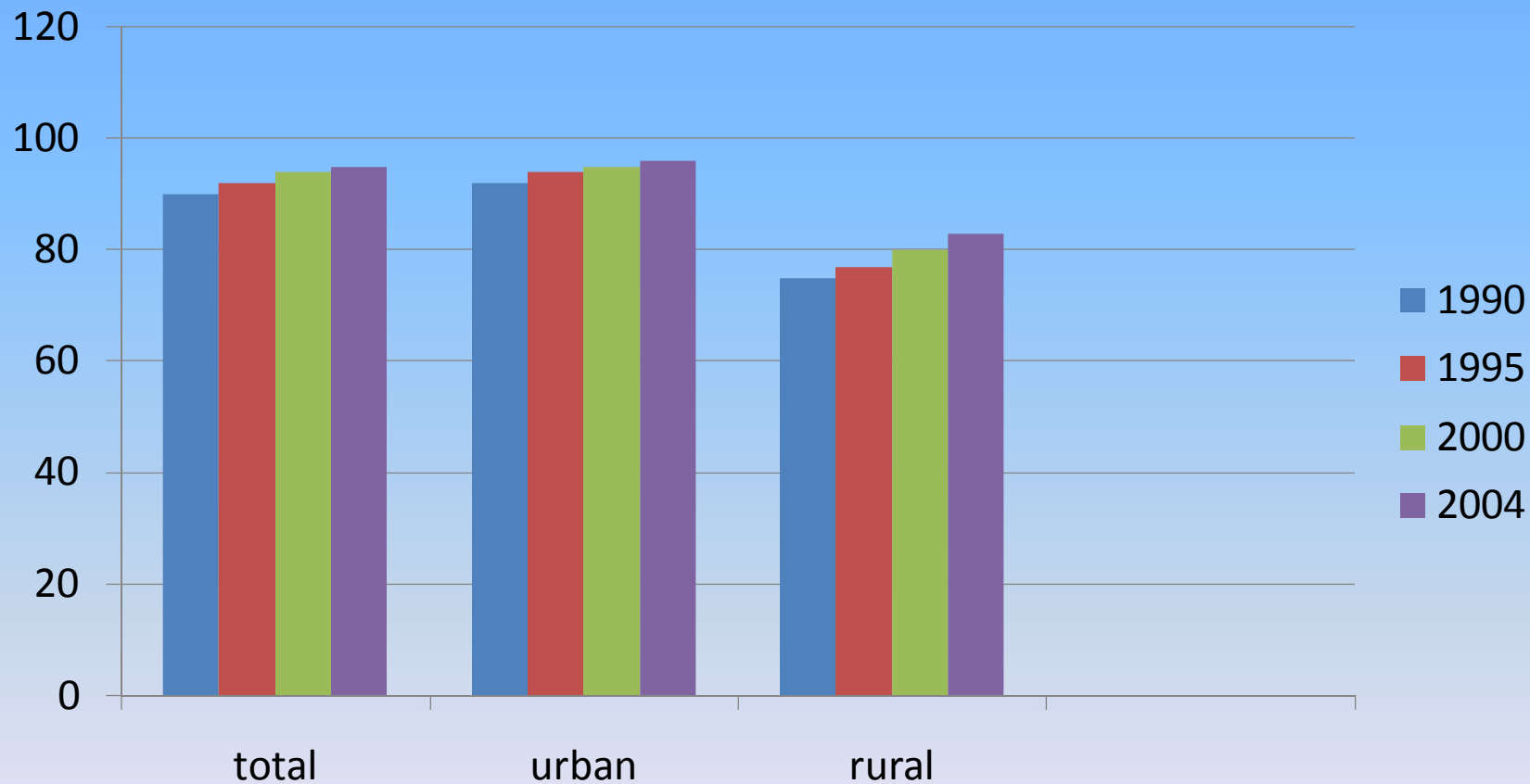

Total water coverage (%)



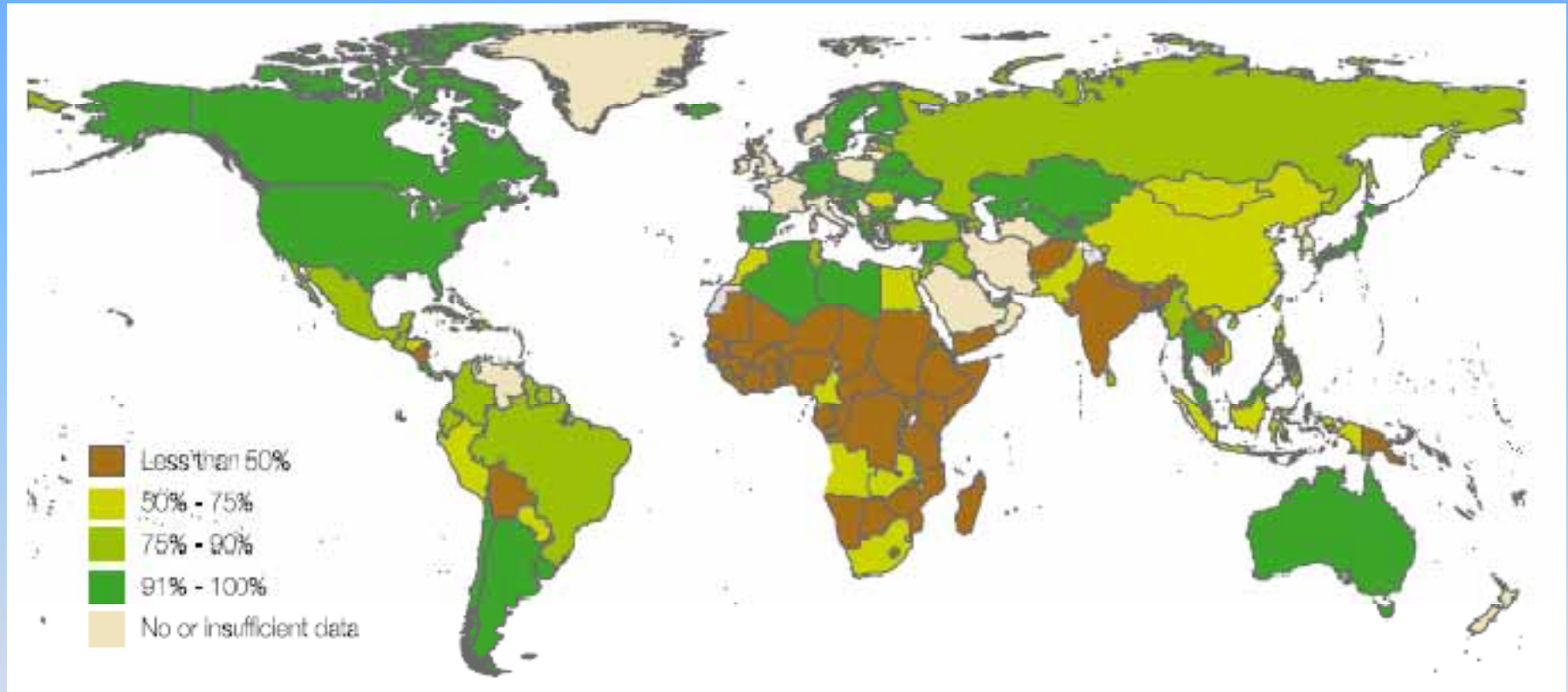

Urban and rural potable water coverage (%)



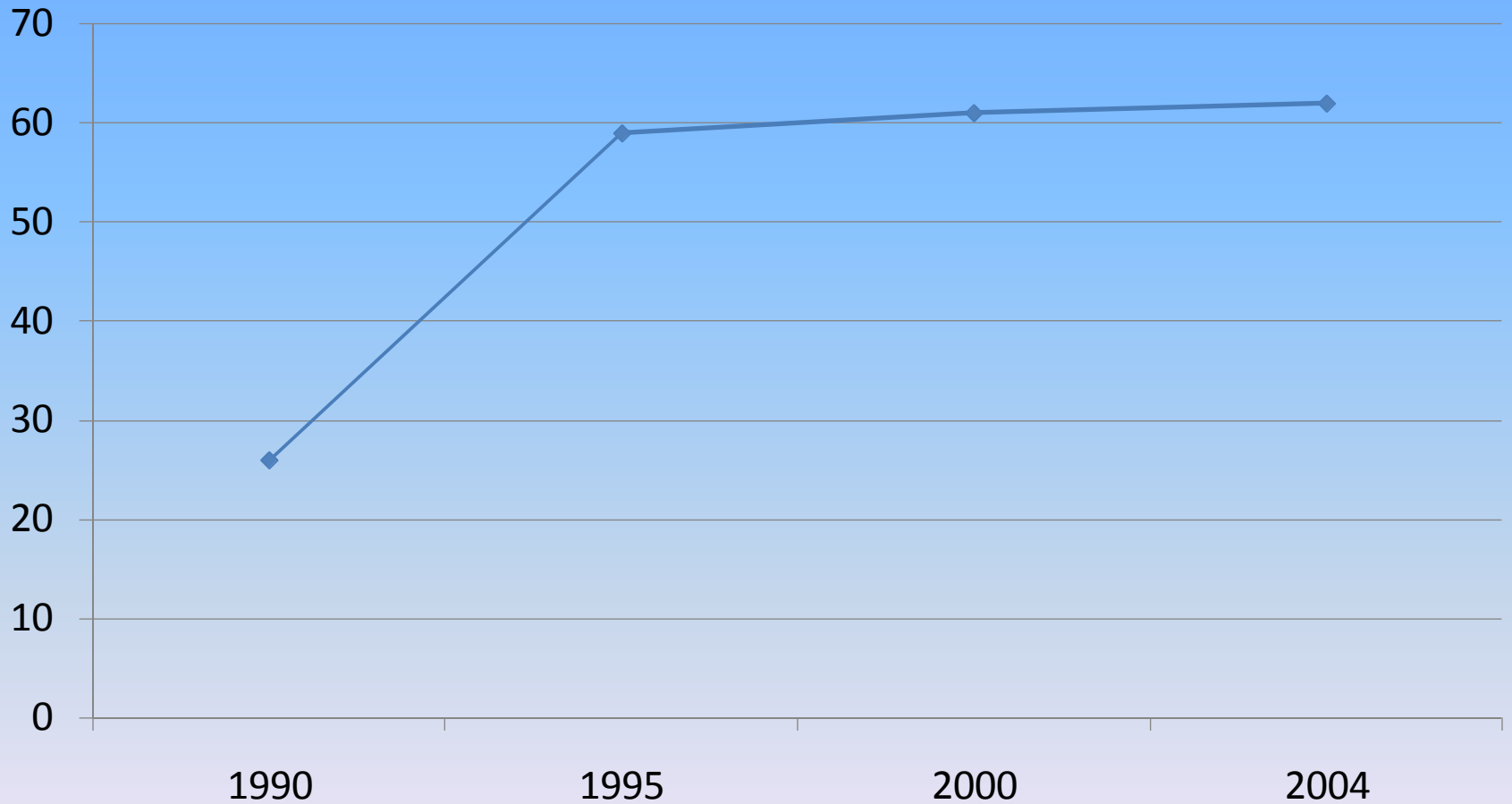

Sanitation. Sewer connection %

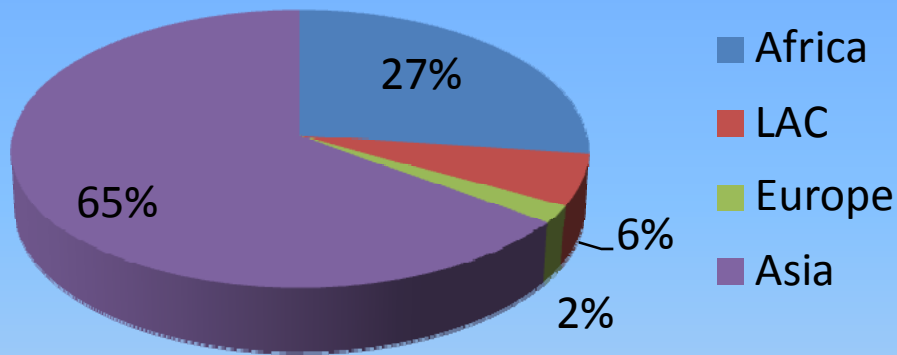

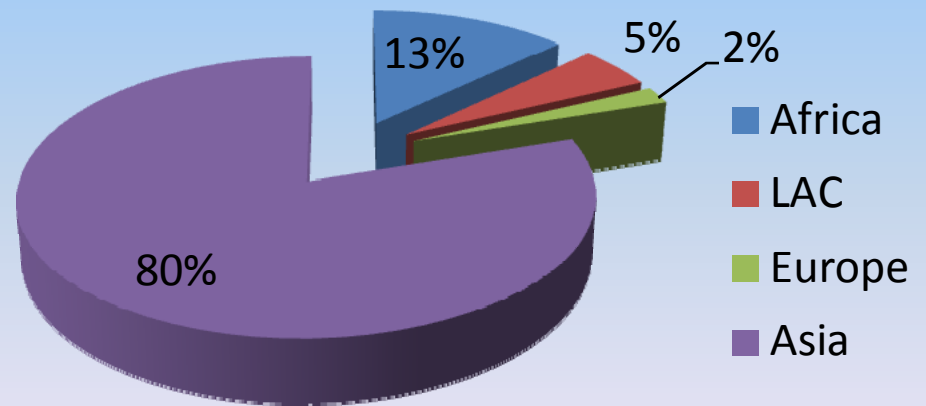
Where is the population without service ?

2,400 millions without sanitation

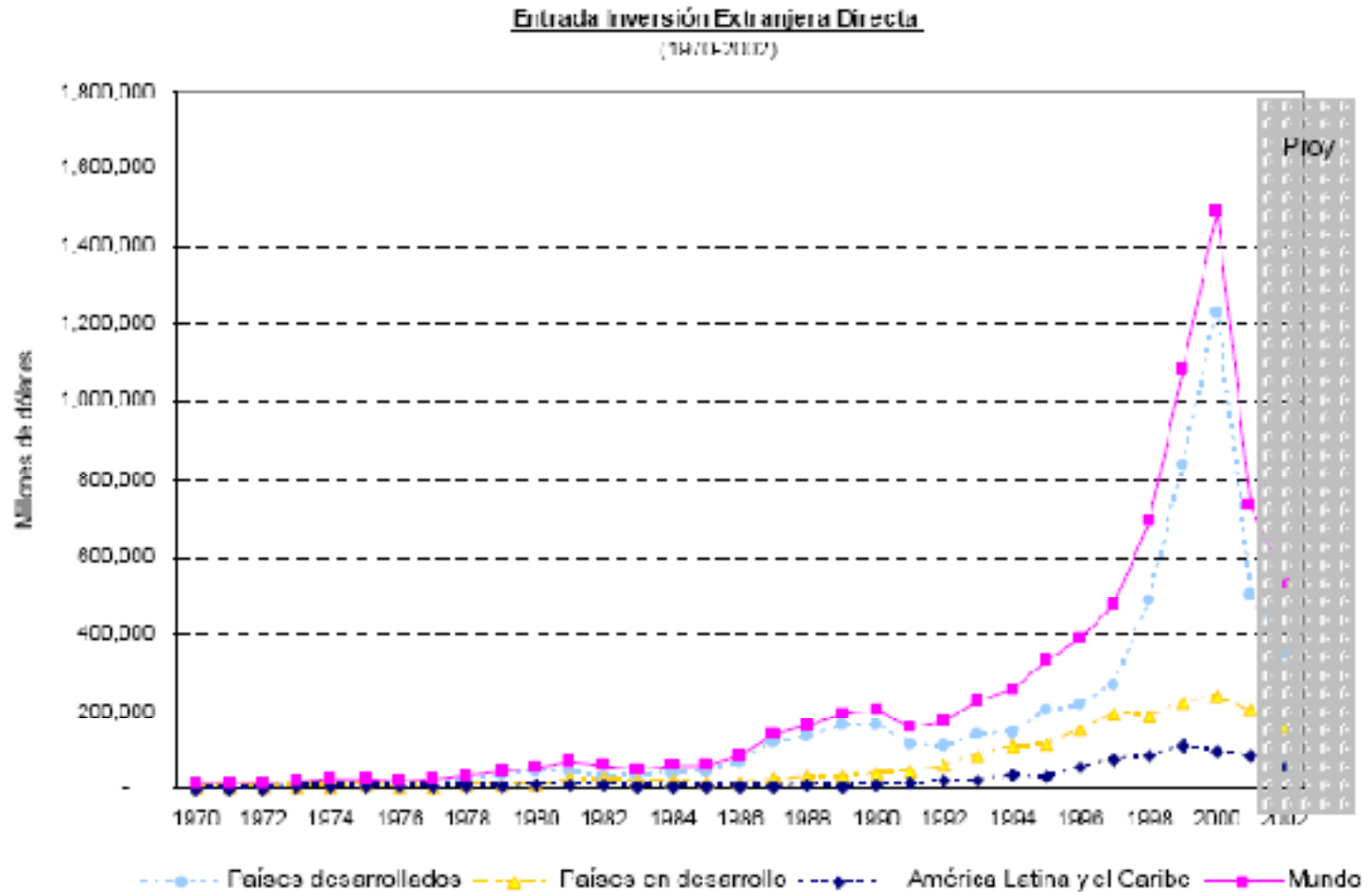

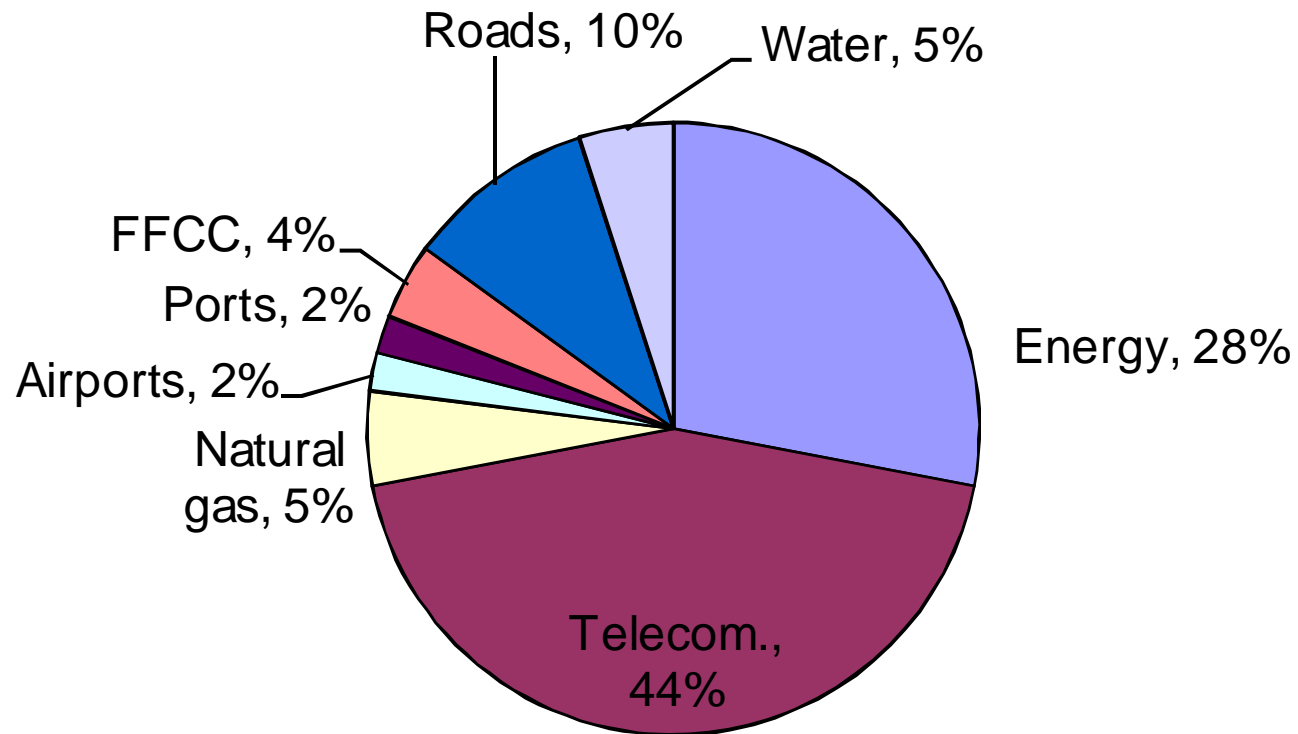


Foreign direct investment



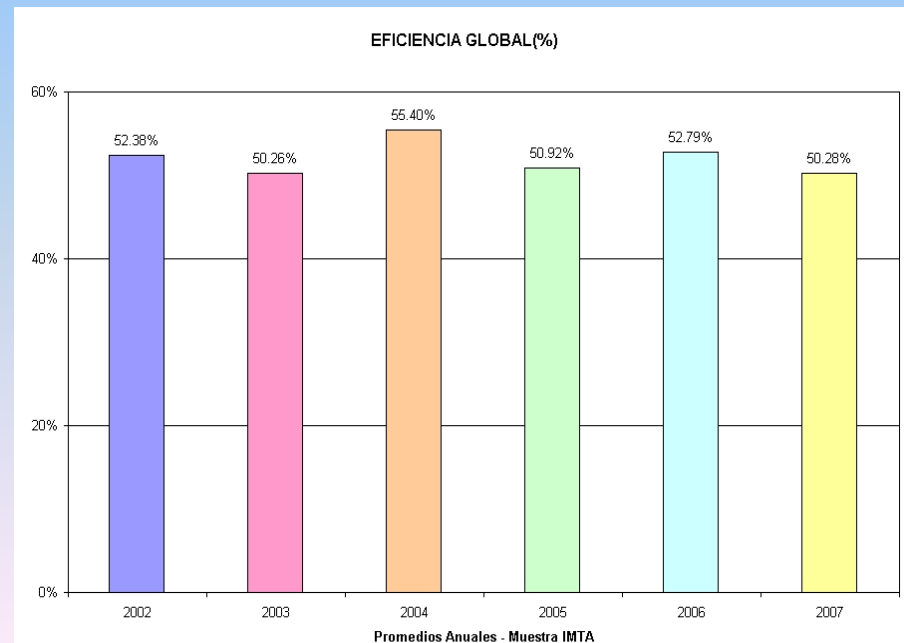

Water Utilities Performance

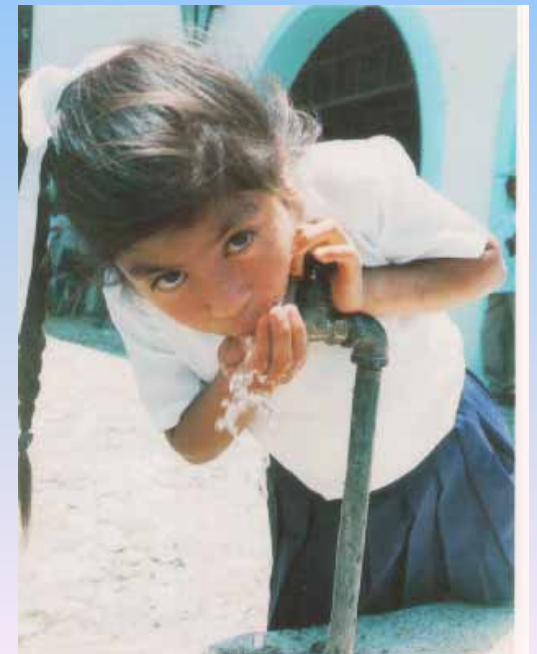
- Very low total (commercial and physical) efficiency
- Cost recovery
- Low tariffs - a political issue
- Financing
 - Private participation (i.e. in Mexico less than 2% of water utilities)
- Poor regulation (with some exceptions)
- Poor service (quantity and quality)
- Small water utilities (i.e. 90% in Mexico with less than 50 people)

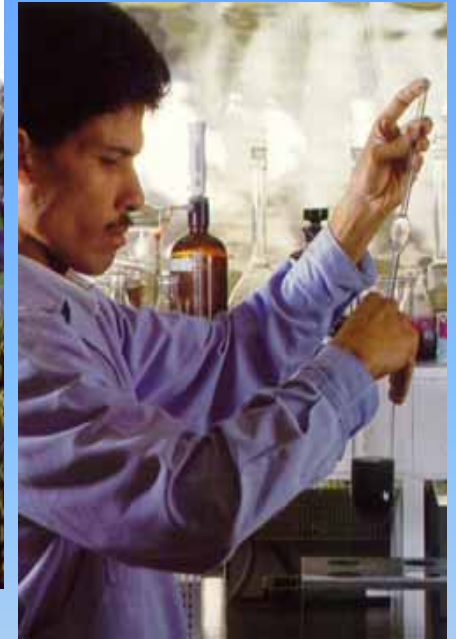


MULTISTAKEHOLDERS COOPERATION OPPORTUNITIES
